Do we have an understanding of the history of the General Service Conference (the "Conference")?

What is a Conference Advisory Action? Does our home group's G.S.R., D.C.M., area delegate report back to the group on the highlights of the Conference and Conference Advisory Actions?

Is our group meeting its wider Seventh Tradition responsibilities?

Please do not submit any birthdays until after they have actually occurred in order to avoid errors and above all embarassment if somebody happens to go back out before they reach their sobriety date. As a reminder, all submissions to *Pass It On* are due no later than the 15th of the month before the (next month's) issue you wish to have your submiswsion published in.

Speaking of submissions: when you submit an announcement, event listing or flyer for publication, be sure to include all relevant information on the submission including the event name, date, time, details, location, contact information (contact info won't be published, but we need it in case there are questions) and last but not least the *AA GROUP* that is sponsoring the event. Without all this information we cannot publish in print or on the web.

2012 (New Years Eve Central Office/Intergroup) Alcathon Summary

The Central Office Intergroup Reps Alcathon was back New Years Eve, and by all measures was a success. With the support of her home group, Ilse G. proposed the idea of reviving the Alcathon to the Intergroup Reps in April last year and by June there was a Central Office Alcathon Committee with two goals for the event:1. to carry the message of AA to alcoholics and offer AAs a safe and friendly place on New Years, especially welcoming newcomers and 2. to be self supporting and maybe even contribute to the Central Office which was experiencing costs greater than inflows from groups' and individuals' contributions.

So how'd we fare? Goal #1: The Alcathon provided a healthy venue for participation and fellowship for those of us with all lengths of sobriety. And safe? Thanks to the security patrols of the parking lot, there were no incidents or break-ins of

vehicles at the Alcathon. Goal #2: The Alcathon budget that had been submitted to the Central Office Intergroup Reps and steering committee was exceeded by 25%. The Alcathon raised over \$1300 for Central Office. Thanks to so many in AA is due.

The infrastructure underlying the Alcathon created the foundation for success. The support of the Central Office steering committee, the Intergroup Reps, our coordinator and alternate coordinator, Michael and Pam, our web chairperson, Alli, the DCMs of Districts 3, 11, 12, 13 and 18, the Area 46 Bilingual Committee chaired by Robert S. and Pass It on Editor Steve R.

Thank you to everyone who showed your support by announcing the Alcathon at the meetings you attend for months I advance, in donating raffle items and buying tickets to win other items, by bringing food to the pot luck and in your attendance at the Alcathon and contributing to the 7th Tradition, and thanks to the groups who sponsored meetings. Groups in the geographic area Central Office serves represented their Districts – District 3, The South Valley Bikers; District 11, Seeking Serenity; District 13, How It Works; and District 18. the Candle Light meeting in Rio Rancho. The AA community showed they want an Intergroup Alcathon by your presence and participation.

Thanks are due individuals who in their participation made the event possible by their hard work. Morgan D. for taking care of all things raffle and working with Alli on the web site, who also deserves our appreciation, to get photos of items on the

The church trusted us with their property to return it as we found it upon arrival. The church asked that a member of their congregation be present throughout the different meetings and meals at the Alcathon. In addition to thanking the church, thanks go out to Ilse G. and Rosie F., two-hatters in the sense that they are members of both AA and the church. Highlights From A.A.W.S.

The A.A. World Services board met on December 7, at the General Service Office in New York, NY. Roberta L., chair of the A.A.W.S. Board, opened the meeting.

Manager's Report: General manager, Phyllis H., reported that following Hurricane Sandy, our emergency disaster plan went into action to assure employee communication and safety and maintain essential operations. Although property damages were common, we were thankful there were no personal injuries. While the G.S.O. office was officially closed during the week of the storm, Staff and employees who reside in New York City stood by and supported the office.

G.S.O.'s Archives revised Oral Histories Kit is available for distribution. The winter issue of Markings is scheduled to be released for distribution in early December. Archives received two new treasures for the repository: a box of materials belonging to August B., a Panel 3 delegate from the Wisconsin area; and a recent recording of Tommie D., who was a past delegate from the Connecticut area in the 1960s. Tommie shared wonderful memories about Bill, Lois, Ebby and the early days.

The Web site Redesign project has been placed on hold until 2013 budget is set.

Phyllis announced that Greg T. has been hired as the new Publications Director. Greg, a past general service trustee, will begin after the start of the new year.

Staff: Work on the 63rd General Service Conference is gearing up. Panel 63 delegates were randomly selected for the 2013 Conference Committees; random selection of Conference members for the fifteen Conference Inventory Groups was also conducted. The 2013 Conference Communications Kit being prepared, and is scheduled to be mailed to Conference members in December.

The Corrections staff member sent the winter 2012 issue of "Sharing from Behind the Walls" to print with a holiday message and several shares about how A.A. members have served as a surrogate family and helped stave off loneliness.

The staff member on the International Desk attended the 11th annual meeting of MERCAA, the Middle Eastern Regional Council of Alcoholics Anonymous, which met in Kuwait. During the week prior to that, she met with members of the Fellowship in Dubai, Sharjah and Abu Dhabi: expatriates, Arabs from the Persian Gulf and two women who are part of the work force from Southeast Asia.

Although delayed by Hurricane Sandy, the winter 2012 issue of Box 4-5-9 was distributed to A.A. members and groups. The visually stunning issue, with a holiday message from Bill W. on the cover, included a wonderful article about A.A. members turning into "thankful givers" as they put their gratitude into action through support of all A.A. services.

The Southeast Regional Forum held in November in Boca Raton, Florida, was attended by 647 members – with 276 first-time Forum attendees present. The Forum included simultaneous translation from English into Spanish in all the main room sessions and two workshops were conducted totally in Spanish, fostering participation from the local Spanish-speaking A.A. community.

An activity update for Intergroups and Central Offices has been sent that includes information about the launch of our new Spanish-language public service announcement "Tengo Esperenza," the October A.A.W.S. Highlights, and our FAQ regarding GSO's response to disasters.

Services: Past issues of Box 4-5-9 in English, French and Spanish have been added to the Web site going back to 1980. The revised version of G.S.O.'s A.A. Web Site Policy has been posted to the sited in English, French and Spanish.

After consideration of a request from the trustees' Archives Committee, the A.A.W.S. board approved the concept of posting selected archival audio recordings on G.S.O.'s A.A. Web Site.

Publishing: Gross print sales through October 31, 2012 were budgeted at \$10,834,000, with actual sales of \$10,664,480, 1.6% below budget. Print book units distributed for this same period totaled 158,114 units; non-A.A. purchases accounting for 37,193 units, or 23.5%.

A.A.W.S. approved the Committee's recommendation that funding for the oral translation of the Navajo Big Book be included in the 2013 A.A.W.S. budget.

Finance: An unaudited financial update as of October 31, 2012 was presented. It was noted that net sales were \$234,700 below budget (2%); gross profit was \$3,300 over budget (.05%) after deducting manufacturing, royalties, shipping and warehousing costs; and contributions were \$24,000 over budget. Travel and Meetings expenses were \$60,000 over budget. It was noted that \$40,000 of the \$69,000 was attributable to World Service Meeting delegates and some Board members being delayed in departing after the WSM and/or Board weekend due to Hurricane Sandy. Net loss for the 10 months was \$122,700 compared with a budgeted loss for the period of \$83,700.

Other: The board reviewed and approved a redrafted Fair Use Policy for A.A. literature which was submitted by the Intellectual Property ("IP") Committee.

The board reviewed and approved both the Amendment to the current Defined Benefit Plan and the new Defined Contribution Plan. Starting January 1, 2013, new employees will participate in the defined contribution plan. Current employees will continue to be covered under the current defined benefit plan.

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
