The First of a Four Part Series:

Part 1

How does a changing world affect what your group is doing today to carry the A.A. message to newcomers.?

Members carry the A.A. message to newcomers by greeting and welcoming them at meetings, holding Step, Tradition, Big Book and speaker meetings, and encouraging strong sponsorship.

A.A. has one message, one program that is carried to all alcoholics. No matter what is happening in the world, one drunk sharing with another continues. One of the most important things is to shake the newcomer's hand and talk to them. Groups need to stick to the basics of our common problem and the solution, as well as keeping the meeting format flexible to focus on the newcomer, and holding frequent business meetings and inventories at the group, district and area levels. Continue to "show" the newcomer what an A.A. meeting is. Encourage them to get phone numbers, and call newcomers, rather than waiting for them to call us--as Dr. Bob and Bill W. did. Provide newcomers with

Conference-approved literature, encourage them to read our history book, and go for coffee after the meeting for face-to-face contact. Assign sponsors or offer temporary sponsorship. Don't baby the newcomer. Keeping the A.A. message and A.A. service simple still works.

Continuity in groups is important, especially with some areas growing with lots of new members. Rural areas don't get many newcomers, and small communities who have no treatment or detox facilities have to get back to the basics. It is important to clear up directories and meeting information; one group has e-mail addresses on lists for newcomers.

Communicating the importance of

identification and explaining our singleness of purpose to the newcomer are important. Stress singleness of purpose to dual-addicted newcomers. More members need to be willing to welcome those who are different with love and then share about our program of recovery and singleness of purpose. One way is by using the literature (e.g., Box 4-5-9 and the Grapevine). Remain aware that Internet knowledge does not necessarily transmit the message of A.A.; we need to give a clear message of what recovery is by using the literature and Twelve Step sponsorship. Encourage rotation and service and involvement in general service.

Be aware of *all* newcomers, not just the young people. It is important to have a least one meeting as a young people's group and incorporate activities to include young people. There is also an increase in cultural and language barriers at meetings. We need to remain inclusive and reach out to minority populations. Groups that have members from different cultures, who speak different languages, are attractive to newcomers. Recognize diversity.

Changes in technology have made everyone appear in a hurry and we don't take the time to get "back to the basics" of the A.A. program. One group has its own Web site to attract newcomers. Groups today have more vehicles for carrying the message (e.g., cell phones, Internet, etc.).

Some members report that more newcomers are attending A.A. through court orders and referrals from treatment facilities. Many attending A.A. through court orders have taken newcomer classes so they know how to behave and what to expect in A.A. meetings. Some areas have increased jail meetings, while other members report that referrals from treatment centers and professionals are on a downward trend. Many newcomers from correctional institutions, treatment facilities and hospitals have dual addictions. Everyone and everybody have been sent to our meetings and this is

having an effect. Therefore, we need to encourage those with problems in addition to alcohol, or with *no* problem with alcohol, to start attending meetings of other fellowships, such as N.A., O.A., C.A., etc. Some groups have newcomer packets, which include the pamphlet, *Problems Other than Alcohol*. One group has male and

female sponsorship chairs to help with initial identification (e.g., young people, those with mental illness, and other addictions). We have to take responsibility to educate treatment centers about what A.A. is and what it is not. We need to take the message to the treatment centers and not wait until they come to us. Newcomers from treatment still need to be Twelfth-stepped in to A.A. and it's up to us to inform professionals and newcomers.

Remind folks to talk from the podium only about alcohol, sponsorship and service. At some Step meetings, members are asked not to share unless they have taken that Step with a sponsor. We need to follow and stay firm on our Twelve Traditions and have regular group inventories.

Don't be afraid to pass on the message, and to remember that our code is love and tolerance, to have compassion, and carry the A.A. message in a gentle but firm way. Offering love, tolerance, and hope with those who are not sure will help them to find where they belong. The changing world has not affected all groups. Strong A.A. groups can weather minor storms easily.
