**Step 5:** *"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."*

All of A.A.'s Twelve Steps ask us to go contrary to our natural desires...they all deflate our egos. When it comes to ego deflation, few Steps are harder to take than Five. But scarcely any Step is more necessary to longtime sobriety and peace of mind than this one. *-Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p55*

If we skip this vital step, we may not overcome drinking... But they had not learned enough of humility, fearlessness and honesty, in the sense we find it necessary, until they told someone else *all* their life story. *-Alcoholics Anonymous p72&73*

When I looked at my list of resentments, it became apparent I became a master at self-deception. Eventually I had convinced myself that everything really was "your" fault, and I was the innocent victim. Given my talent for passing the buck, it's apparent that a solitary self appraisal wouldn't fit the bill. Once I tell someone else the whole shebang I can truly experience freedom from the crushing weight of some of these secrets I've tried to hide from you, as well as becoming accountable for the parts of my story that I have previously tried to hide from myself. Then, I can grow.

**Tradition 5:** *"Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers."*

"Shoemaker, stick to they last!"...better do one thing supremely well than many badly. That is the central theme of this Tradition. Around it our Society gathers in unity. The very life of our Fellowship requires the preservation of this principle *-Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p150* My understanding of this Tradition is rooted in humility. I learn that I must set aside my personal ambitions, agendas, issues, opinions and the like, at whatever personal cost, to focus on my experience as an alcoholic and recovery within A.A. The way I understand it tells me that while I may have an addiction to any number of ideas, activities or substances, A.A. is here to deal with one issue: my alcoholism. I didn't have to relate on any other level when I arrived in A.A. I didn't feel that I needed to have experienced the many "yets" of our program. Members of A.A. told me of their experience with alcoholism and sobriety and I knew I was home, at last. We are all unique, with our own individual stories and experiences, none more valuable than another, but in A.A. we deal with one common problem, and one common solution.

**Concept 5:** *"Throughout our world services structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, thus assuring us that minority opinion will be heard and that petitions for the redress of personal grievances will be carefully considered."*

Newcomers to the A.A.'s General Service Conference are often surprised at the pains taken by the presiding officer to make sure the minority has a second opportunity to present its views. Even after extensive debate on an issue, followed by a vote in which a "substantial unanimity" is reached, those opposed are polled individually to see if they wish to speak further to their minority view. In fact, numerous instances can be cited in which this minority view is so compelling the Conference has then reversed itself...the minority has the actual *duty* of presenting its views...The well-heard minority, therefore, is our chief protection against an uninformed, misinformed, hasty or angry majority. *-The Twelve Concepts for World Service Illustrated* The first time I witnessed a vote reversed after hearing a minority opinion I realized I was part of something truly incredible. All the misconceptions I had about "A.A. politicians" were immediately put to rest. I witnessed the spirit of love and humility in action. I witnessed a loving God working within our fellowship.

## WHO'S NEXT?

Who's next? Now that is a great rock album! But today it represents an important expression of practicing one of the traditions. It's that one that says 'Every group needs the least possible organization. Rotating leadership is the best. The small group may elect its secretary...' My first experience with tradition nine, sharing time in leadership, came early in sobriety. My best A.A. buddy at the time was Dwight V. He was a wild man... A white-haired, blue-eyed Hawaiian shirt wearing recovered alcoholic. He loved to say life was 'groovy'. He helped teach me about the spirit of rotation. Today I know it was God doing the teaching.

Dwight and I met at my first home group. It was as a great A.A. group but it became spiritually sick. Almost all the members left the meeting. I missed that meeting and the fellowship. Eventually, Dwight and I decided we should start another meeting – a new home group. We contacted a church, found a room, a time, and a format. We had to buy all sorts of meeting equipment like chips, coffee, cups, coffee pot, and a few books. We did this all with our own funds. This, I was told by Dwight, was service—we were to be fully self-supporting. God made all this possible. Everything was groovy.

The meeting started with a few regular attendees. We took turns chairing the meeting. In a short while, the meeting attendance rose appreciably. I was appointed G.S.R. Dwight was treasurer. After a year, Dwight said we needed to rotate. "What?" I asked. He described how the ninth tradition instructs us to rotate out of our service positions to keep anyone from feeling like they are in charge. So we had an election at a business meeting. Dwight reminded us that no one was in charge, except God. "Who's next?" was adopted as a mantra.

The spirit of rotation was alive and well in our group. It became a tradition to hand the spare key off to the next person who would be the chair and lead the meeting for the next month. That person was responsible for opening the door, getting the meeting set up and leading the meeting. The newcomers were given rotating jobs like greeter to take part in a service commitment. It really helped to keep them coming back.

Dwight moved out of town after a while but the spirit he instilled still lives on. Our meeting now has around 50 regular attendees. We have a monthly rotation of the group chair, two year rotations of secretary, treasurer, G.S.R. and an alternate G.S.R., and a few various service positions. I think of Dwight at these group conscience meetings, when someone holds out the key and asks "who's next?" It is my wish that everyone take an opportunity to experience the traditions first hand in sobriety. It is possible to create the fellowship you crave and participate in the spirit of rotation. I thank God for this valuable lesson in spiritual leadership. Now... Who's next?

When I first came to A.A. and heard the promises read at a meeting I was immediately intrigued but also highly skeptical. Not only did this entire room of alcoholics believe these things were possible, but as I stuck around I noticed they had actually come true for many of them. It took some time, but I started to believe that if it could work for them, then maybe it could work for me to.

And I can happily say today that it has worked and those promises really do come true. The funny thing is, the reality of the promises in my life go far beyond what I had hoped for in the beginning. My imagination wasn’t even big enough to imagine the happiness, freedom and serenity I feel today. Every day I am amazed at what my life has become and I am filled with gratitude for the gifts of sobriety. Are these extravagant promises? Definitely. But are they possible? Absolutely!

## VERY SOBER OLD(er) PEOPLE!

---

In the April PIO, the editor called for some words from some “Old Timers.” Now I don’t know where I fit. I am 73 years old, but just ten years sober, but I have done a lot of service work in my ten years and would like to comment on what I am seeing from young people in A.A. service. First a little background about myself. I was a public school teacher for thirty six years and after retiring and getting sober, I have done service work for both the Albuquerque Intergroup and Area 46. I don’t know why this is, but I have noticed that different generations of young people have had different outlooks on such things as service or lack of service to the human community. These outlooks carry over to our A.A. community also.

My awareness of a recent change in the outlook of our younger A.A.’s became apparent when after about five and a half years of service on the Albuquerque Intergroup steering committee, I left for two years so I could devote my time and energy to a demanding Area 46 service position. After rotating out of that position at the end of December, I assumed a new position on the Intergroup steering committee. Much to my delight a young and devoted group of people had volunteered to do service work for the intergroup. After witnessing a great number of generations of young people who seemed mostly interested in “me”, what a wonderful surprise to find young people interested in what they can do for others.

Now, I realize I am making some sweeping generalizations, but I do perceive there is a big change in young peoples attitudes for the most part. I have also talked to others who have been in service for many more years than I have and they agree with me.

I don’t know if this is a national phenomenon or just a local glitch, but my experience and what I read tells me this may be national or even world wide. If so it is going to energize A.A.’s service work like nothing in a long time.
