Spiritual Experiences vs. Awakening! (Part I)

My first day sober was May 3, 1975; I was 33 years old and had had enough. My very first meeting was amazing! I didn't hear a lot of what was being said, but I felt LOVE, a love that I had never experienced before. I knew that my higher power was in that room. I wanted what those people had and was willing to go to any lengths to get it. That was my first spiritual experience in sobriety.

Now at 72 years old looking back over my 39 years of sobriety I see a lot of life experiences mixed in with spiritual experiences too numerous to count. Some sound like fairy tales when I relate them to others, too good to be true. For example:

One August just before leaving on a trip to California to see my daughter, I sat in my car and asked my Higher Power what I needed to do before I left. I received an inspiration to take my past car repair receipts. After collecting them I stowed them in my glove compartment. I asked again and got the inspiration to go to my mechanic and ask what I needed to know before driving through the desert. I did exactly as I was instructed and was told that I needed to turn my heater up full blast to cool the engine down. Sure enough while driving in the desert my car did overheat! It was 105-115 degrees outside; I had windows open and the heater full blast! At least it cooled the motor down. As I drove into Barstow, the first significant town on the other side of the desert, my car rolled to a stop. The problem was a part that was still under warranty, as explained in the receipts that I brought with me. I was able to get the car repaired for no cost and they replaced a few hoses that were cracked for free. Since I had only enough money for gas and food, and one night in Barstow, where I had planned to spend the night, I deemed the whole experience miraculous.

I was to have many such experiences through the years intermixed with deaths of loved ones, divorces, and such. Life happens and my Higher Power has always helped me walk through any situation. I experienced my conception of my Higher Power and my roles in this life evolve over the years.

At 15 years sobriety I dealt with PTSD from flashbacks of childhood abuse that I (continued on page 3)

had suppressed and later dealt with years of depression and anxiety. My Higher Power didn't stop working and I didn't stop believing. I was aware God was with me, but I did most of the leading; God became my co-pilot. There was actually 9 years after my 25th AA anniversary that I attended very few meetings. But finally in 2009 I rededicated myself to serving AA and giving back what I had been so freely given.

At 36 years sobriety I was frustrated with my anxieties always plaguing me and limiting my ability to leave my house to interact with others. I only left my house three times a week for meetings and once a week for groceries. Being retired and single with no family in town, there was no one to see and nothing to do.

One day in that fall of 2011 I came across an AA slogan that said, "If God is your co-pilot, change seats." Opps! That got my attention. I determined that I was missing something in my 11th step. I had worked steps one through nine, took a tenth step inventory occasionally, and glanced and nodded at steps eleven and twelve. I occasionally tried to work step eleven. I found, many years ago, that I could practice mindfulness, a sort of meditating without the sitting and closing my eyes. However, I never really considered the intent and practice of step eleven and what that would look like for me.

I was frustrated with living with my anxieties and strongly desired to be closer to my Source. I finally noticed the words "self-forgetting" in the eleventh step in the 12x12. The only time I experience self-forgetting is in the present when I drop out of thinking. I was determined to spend time not thinking, to really be present for God to have a chance to heal my mind and enter my life. What a concept! Not think?!

Thinking our way into Action? Or Acting our way into Thinking?

When I got to AA this last time, I was adrift on a sea of booze There was precious little logical thinking and meticulous execution going on at my house!

My experience at that point was that I was in physical and mental pain, 24/7. Since only alcohol had ever really helped, I kept trying it even though it had pretty much quit working. At the end of the drinking, if I could get drunk enough, there would be a brief period when the pain would let up a bit, but no longer than minutes or at most a couple hours.

When I found my original home group, one of the things that kept me coming back was that I felt kind of ok while I was at the meetings. When I wasn't at the meetings, the "blender-brain" would slowly start up again. I found that I needed a lot of meetings.

When my Original Sponsor asked me if I was ready for the Third Step, I honestly did not have a clue. So I said, "I guess so." And he then got on his knees in his kitchen there, and asked me to do the same. Then, he asked me to read the Third Step prayer out loud.

I don't know about you, but by golly that seemed like a LOT like action to me at the time. I really didn't want to do it, but he said that's what we had to do in order to say we had "worked the Third Step."

He immediately began to badger me about the Fourth Step, had I started on it yet, etc. Every damn meeting. So, yeah, that seemed a lot like action to me too.

Even Six and Seven, though they seem like nothing in the Big Book, the way we were taught them, they were daily, moment by moment steps. I was told to keep in mind the behavioral problems that had emerged in my Fifth Step. I was to assess myself when they began to emerge in my behavior and see if I was ready to give them up. (In other words I in Step Six?) If I was ready, then I was to ask for them to be removed before they manifested (Step Seven).

I was told that I was as powerless to "fix" myself as I was powerless against booze - I had to ask something outside me to help (Steps Two and Seven). Again, it seemed like a lot of work (action) at the time.

Just because something seems mostly mental, at least for me, doesn't mean it doesn't require significant effort! A program of action. Yup. That's what it feels like to me. Central Office encourages all groups to elect an Intergroup representative. Join us at the next Intergroup meeting the second Sunday of every month, at 2 pm, at the Brownbaggers.


