Wrinkles in My Ego

STEP SIX says, "Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character." How to be entirely ready has been quite a puzzler for me. I have to keep in mind that the Step does not say, "I tinkered with my personality till I became perfect." First of all, I am not sure what perfect is; and second, when it comes to ironing out the wrinkles in my ego, I am about as clever as a gorilla repairing a wristwatch.

The first thing I have to keep in mind is that God does the removing, as well as deciding what is to be removed. So many of my difficulties were caused by the misapplication of God-given virtues that if I tried to sort them out, I would very likely throw out much of the wheat with the chaff. But, after twenty years of hind me. The sixth job finally paid off, and I got back trying to become entirely ready for God to do His work, I can honestly say it sure is worth the effort.

At one time or another, many of us feel insecure, inadequate, and uncertain. Somehow, we just aren't very enthusiastic about the present. As of today, I am guite sure what *not* to do for this state of affairs. I used to resort to a form of liquid courage that seemed to be just what I needed.

For me today, the process of becoming ready to have God remove these defects of character starts with being where it is happening--at meetings! If we ask for God's guidance and go about our business as though we were going to get it--we will. I also believe that we should be active in seeking God's help and passive in accepting His guidance.

since I have been mixed-up for several decades, it would not be realistic for me to expect to come up smelling like Albert Schweitzer overnight. "Though the mills of God grind slowly, yet they grind exceeding small." I have to tell myself: Stay sober and wait.

It is very difficult to steer a parked car and make much progress toward any destination. I try to get moving by using what I have. When I first came to AA, I was so far gone, I couldn't remember a phone number long enough to dial it, so I had to write it down. I was not stable enough to hold a good job, so I took a mediocre job. In fact, I had five jobs after I sobered up, and each paid less than the previous one. You might say I had a very promising future beto my trade. I had to use what I had. In short, I had to be going somewhere before I could be guided.

These are some of the things I have learned along the way from the people in AA. I have also seen people who have grasped the program hang on in spite of tremendous odds, such as slow death by cancer or sudden loss of loved ones by accident. Whatever the character defects of these people might have been, drinking was not among them. They stuck to the program.

God as I understand Him does not cheat anyone. I don't pretend to know how, when, or where the score is evened up, but I am certain that it always is.

These are emotional booby traps baited with pride and vengefulness. When we are tempted by the bait, we should train ourselves to step back and think. We can neither think not act to good purpose until the habit of self-restraint has become automatic.



- **3**. Are all the officers and members of our local club for AAs familiar with "Guidelines on Clubs" (which is available free from GSO)?

4. Should the secretary of our group serve on the mayor's advisory committee on alcoholism? Some alcoholics will stay around AA only if we have a TV and card room. If this is what is required to carry the message to them, should we have these facilities?

Intergroup Meeting Minutes, May 8, 2016 BrownBaggers Meeting Space

In attendance: Stephen How It Works, Johnny W.,Intergroup Liason, Isleta Gp., Gayle-Downtown Lunch Bunch, Ginger IG Secretary, Serenity Gp., Jeff C. Community Outreach, Straight Pepper Diet, Henry L. District 11, Seeking Serenity, Lydia R. Schedule Ed. Seeking Serenity, Eric, Brownbaggers, Tom M., IG Treasurer, Dawn Patrol, Michael W. C.O. Coordinator, Too Much for Us, Alaina G. Special Needs, Ladies Room.

At 2:12, Treasurer Tom, also acting Chair, opened the meeting with the Serenity Prayer. Introductions

Treasurer's Report, Tom: The Income Statement ending April 30, 2016, showed Total Revenues at \$8043.91; Total Cost of Sales at \$3472.40; Group Contributions were \$1999.08; Individual and other contributions were \$539.25; Faithful Fiver Contributions were at \$200.00; other AA Contributions, \$48.99. Revenues, \$8043.91; Cost of Sales, \$3472.40; Total Gross Income was \$4571.51. Operating Expenses were \$5811.51. Net Income was

-\$1240.00. Motion was made by Henry to accept and 2nd by Alaina to accept the Treasurer's Report. Motion passed unanimously. April 10, 2016 meeting minutes were read by Secretary Ginger B. upon her arrival.

Motion to accept the minutes with amendments was made and seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Office Coordinator, Michael W.: Alternate Coordinator, Debra K. is working the desk phones this afternoon and is therefore unable to be at the meeting. He provided the Service Activities Report (attached) in her absence. Substitute desk workers are needed. *We're only as strong as our participation.*

Chips and books are on the way. Purchasing fewer books, which costs more in shipping charges; less revenue per book is the result. Taking on-line contributions: A copy of the contributions website page was passed out for review. Michael advised that the wording is in line with AA Traditions and is set up in accordance with those Traditions. Minor changes to be made to the page, and then it will go live on the website. There are a number of ways to contribute to Central Office, such as becoming a monthly Faithful Fiver or Trusted Tenner; monthly bill pay, walk in and pay with credit or debit card...now we will also provide on-line contribution payment.

Ways the groups are helping to raise funds to cover C.O. shortfalls: A number of groups are increasing their contributions to C.O. by certain percentages; other groups are passing a separate can; Intergroup Speaker meetings are being hosted by groups; Groups can also hold a C.O. Workshop.

Alternate Coordinator, Debra K.: Working the desk – see attached report.

Schedule Editor, Lydia: New schedule was printed. Website should be current regarding meetings; the website is updated as meeting changes come in.

Special Needs, Alaina: The Ladies Room is self-supporting in regards to ASL Interpreters. Men's Stag cannot support an ASL Interpreter. Brown Baggers has a 6-7pm meeting with ASL Interpreter on Saturday nights, along with another meeting – although we don't know when that meeting is.

Media Librarian, Ric: Absent.

Community Outreach, Jeff: Nothing coming up in the near future. The committee has a Jobs Corp commitment monthly, where information on AA is provided to the adolescents there. NMCYPAA will speak to this group soon.

Intergroup Liaison, Johnny: Getting familiar with the position and will get list of groups to visit.

Website Chair: Absent.

Old Business;

Vacant Positions to be filled:

Member at Large – no volunteers.

Pass It On Editor – Susan W. put together and printed the May Pass-It-On, and was unable to be here today; however, she will be at the meeting next month to stand for disapproval for this position. A motion was made and 2nd to accept Susan W. as temporary PIO editor. Motion carried unanimously.

Shortfall in Central Office finances: Michael advised that there are no utilities other than the phone or Internet; Ginger B., as group rep for Serenity Group advised that her group would like to know if C.O. has considered reorganization as a way to cut costs. Michael advised that Central Office operates in the manner the groups had intended since the 1970s. Staff at C.O. works for the groups. By -Laws would have to be looked at, amendments voted upon by Intergroup, in order to reorganize.

New Business:

ASL Checking Account held by Central Office – Alaina wanted to know if that account would remain open to receive funds. Treasurer Tom advised that it would.

Announcements

District 18 is holding an Intergroup Speaker Meeting on May 14th.

Motion to close the meeting made by Lydia; 2nd by Alaina. Meeting was closed with the Serenity Prayer at 3:15 p.m.

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
