A chance to share our "inexperience" within the framework of AA

MY FIRST contact with AA was in Buffalo, N.Y., over eleven years ago, at the age of twenty-three. The number of young people in AA was small, and I was lost and lonely as ever. I could identify readily with the members' stories, as I'd been in bad shape from day one, but how to get well was something else. I stayed sober purely on guts for almost two years.

This is probably the most significant problem the young person faces: He has little or no productive past, and organizing a life terrifies him. Being young, we recover fast physically, and some oldtimers believe we're doing great. But our insides still boil like mad. It appears that members of young people's groups have faced this fact and begun to challenge each other's fronts. We pretend not to care about a job, a wife, a car, or anything else that is brought up, until somebody finally sits us down and tells us about fear of failure.

In Buffalo, and later in Colorado Springs, it seemed to me that AA people thought it was great for young people to join, but when it came to really "allowing" us to participate in group activities, that never happened. Feeling left out of society and merely tolerated really bugs many of us. I will add here that these sick feelings I had didn't help the group to warm to me, but many of us come to AA in that kind of shape.

In 1961, in Denver, I finally sobered up again and walked into a group with a new attitude: I am here, and I will get in, and I will get well in spite of my sick feelings, fears, hates. After a while, I realized that other young people weren't staying. I had

help from. So some of us got together to form a young people's group.

It had been tried before, and had failed. Over and over we heard that it was unnecessary and that ours would fold as the other had. Being an unpopular group, we were not particular about who came in, and we had all kinds. We struggled, and were still there to welcome the International Conference of Young People, held July 1967, in Denver. Yet the only thing we ever did in that early group was talk about us and how we really felt before and after getting sober. Had I not been forced to be responsible for my group, show up every week, and talk about me, I doubt if I'd be here and sober today.

In these groups, it's pretty hard to put up a front when everyone around you has the same hang-ups. That is the second significant characteristic of young people's groups. When you take the bottle away from a young, active, hostile, antisocial character, you have the same character, minus bottle. It is probably hard for any group to stomach this opinionated, obnoxious cat. Therefore, he doesn't fit in well and ends up with little activity in the group and few friends. In a young people's group, most of us were or are like this, and the group can understand and survive such behavior until the newcomer settles into the group. Like any group, most of us have lots of problems, but the understanding among us and the talking about ourselves prevail. I'm sure these facts are true of other groups, too, but I think they are most important in young people's groups.

Surprisingly, the problem of sex is not any bigger than in other groups. Some chasing goes on, as it does in any group of people. Most groups and individuals I've met face the problem with a good degree of honesty. Drug addiction is a cont. on page 5

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Corrections Corner

In a recent *Pass It On* (PIO) Corrections Corner article, which appeared in the May issue of PIO, I shared about a lesson I learned while attending this year's Colorado Corrections Conference in Canyon City, CO. I just finished reading the July '08 issue of the *AA Grapevine*, and in an article titled <u>All-American Alcoholic</u>, the author reaffirms the point I was trying to make in my article. Here's part of what he said,

"My first AA meeting on the street was the same day I was released, which my sponsor suggested. I needed to get hooked into AA and the Fellowship. I wore my prison khakis to the meeting because I had gained seventy pounds and had no clothes that fit me. I had no wheels. The guys would pick me up and take me to meetings. Using the group as my Higher Power, I intuitively knew what to do—get myself to meetings and get to work. Today, I have embraced this new way of life. AA has given me hope."

I believe that quite often, when a person is released from a correctional facility, that person has very little resources to help out. Typically, the individual has very little or no money, no family support, no car or driver's license, no place to live, and not much hope. For many of them, A.A. is the only appreciable resource they have.

The second part of this article was written by Brian Valenzuela, District 11's Corrections Chair. Brian has done a considerable amount of work to coordinate the AA activities that take place at the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Detention Center (MDC), and here is what he wanted included in this article:

There are many new opportunities to be of service in Corrections. Some opportunities require an orientation and background check and some do not.

The Second Chance Center is located in the old Westside Jail near the Double Eagle Airport. A Big Book Study meeting is on Wednesday's from 7:00-8:00 PM and we're looking for volunteers to commit to one meeting a month. Clearance is not required; however you need at least one year of sobriety to chair a meeting.

A.A. Volunteers are needed on Sunday's at 6:30 for the Bernalillo Juvenile Detention and Youth Services Center located at 5100, 2nd St. in Albuquerque. An application and clearance are required.

The Regional Correctional Center is the commercially run downtown jail near the courthouse at 415 Roma NW. The meetings are on Tuesdays from 7:30 PM to 8:30 PM. There is one man's meeting and one woman's meeting. An application and background check is required.

The Metropolitan Detention Center has asked Alcoholics Anonymous to increase the number of meetings taking place at this facility. Five mens' meetings have increased to eleven meetings and three women's meetings have increased to six meetings. Meetings in this facility take place from 6:00 to 7:00 PM on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. Orientation for this facility takes place every month on the first Thursday morning from 8:00 AM to 11:00 AM. Criteria for clearance, is one year of sobriety and one year away from misdemeanors, three years away from felonies.

problem in many groups, but here we have a slight advantage. A young addict who comes to one of our groups is accepted provided he remembers it *is* an AA group. Between the alcoholics and the addicts, the problem is usually faced; help is offered; and the person either gets well or gets lost, without spreading his problem to the sick alcoholic who is trying to get well.

The pill-head poses a real problem. Most young people who have been around awhile seem pretty adamantly antimedication. They feel most of us can survive without it and should suffer a little so that we will stick close to the group.

According to the World Directory and local financial statements, the financial contributions of young people's groups to GSO and Central Offices or Intergroups appear to be very low. Most of our groups are very poor. Many young people do not recover financially for a long time. Divorce, becoming more prevalent yearly, is one big cause. Many young men I know are either hung with high support payments or are running from them and are afraid to get

good jobs. Many others have little or no employment background and, therefore, end up starting out at low-salaried jobs.

Many view a young people's group as an immature bunch. That is probably true; often, the members include few stable, longtime-sober people. Good members with one, two, or three years of sobriety sometimes seem to gravitate to more mature groups as they grow, and then they only occasionally show up at young people's meetings. Although this keeps the group small and immature, it also keeps it from getting *too* big and creating a schism.

Also, we do not wish to draw our members away from the general run of AA activities in their areas. We want to participate in AA--all of it; but some of us do better if we first share our inexperience among ourselves.


