**Tradition 7** (*Short Form*) Every group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

(Long Form) The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

**Concept 7** (*Short Form*) The Charter and Bylaws of the General service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness.

(Long Form) The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness.

#### On the 7th Tradition

"The A.A. Groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contribution of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve its ideal: that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority."

Our growth continuing, the combined income of Alcoholics Anonymous members will soon reach the astounding total of \$250,000,000, a quarter of billion dollars yearly. This is the direct result of A.A. membership. Sober we now have it, drunk we would not.

By contrast, our overall A.A. expenses are trifling.

#### On the 7th Tradition (continued from page 1)

For instance, the A.A. General Office now costs us \$1.50 per member a year. As a fact, the New York office asks the groups for this sum twice a year because not all of them contribute. Even so, the sum per member is exceedingly small. If an A.A. happens to live in a large metropolitan center where an intergroup office is absolutely essential to handle heavy inquiries and hospital arrangements he contributes (or probably should contribute) about \$5.00 annually. To pay the rent of his own group meeting place, and maybe coffee and doughnuts, he might drop \$25.00 a year in the hat. Or, if he belongs to a club it could be \$50.00. In case he takes The A.A. Grapevine he squanders an extra \$2.50!

So, the A.A. member who really meets his group responsibilities finds himself liable for about \$5.00 a month on the average. Yet his own personal income may be anywhere between \$200. and \$2,000. a month -- the direct result of not drinking.

"But", some will contend, "our friends want to give us money to furnish that new club house. We are a new small-group. Most of us are still pretty broke. What then"?

I am sure that myriads of the A.A. voices would now answer the new group saying, "Yes, we know just how you feel. We once solicited money ourselves. We even solicited publicly. We thought we could do a lot of good with other peoples' money. But we found that kind of money too hot to handle. It aroused unbelievable controversy. It simply wasn't worth it. Besides, it set a precedent which has tempted many people to use the valuable name of Alcoholics Anonymous for other than A.A. purposes. While there may be little harm in a small friendly loan which your group really means to repay, we really beg you to think hard before you ask the most willing friend to make a large donation. You can, and you soon will, pay your own way. For each of you these overhead expenses will never amount to more than the price of one bottle of good whiskey a month. You will be everlastingly thankful if you pay this small obligation yourselves.

When reflecting on these things, why should not each of us tell himself, "Yes, we A.A.s were once a burden on everybody. We were 'takers.' Now that we are sober, and by the Grace of God have become responsible citizens of the world, why shouldn't we now about face and become 'thankful givers'! Yes, it is high time we did!".

#### **AA In Canada**

When I First arrived in Quebec City, where I went to visit my nephew and his family, I phoned AA. "Where's the nearest meeting?" I asked. In French, the woman replied. "Slower, slower, slower, s'il vous plait," I asked, and after several tries, I got the address down, and thanked her. That night, my nephew and I crunched through the snow, knocked on several doors, and finally discovered that there was no meeting that night -it was another night! Undaunted, because I love to visit meetings in new places, I called again the next day, and was lucky enough to find someone who spoke English as well as French. (My French goes back to high school days.) He directed me to a noon meeting on Saturday, which fit in wit our schedule, but necessitated my taking the bus, alone, to get there. Which I did, on a snowy, cold day. I hiked through wet snow to a church, and located AA.

Lots of people crowded around, and I made my way to a chair and squeezed in. Everyone wore snow boots, and the floor was slushy. The meet-ing began with singing along with a tape, not a tune I recognized, but a pleasant melody, and all seemed to participate. There were slogans on the walls, in French, of course, and the serenity prayer in large print; a coffee pot, and a plate of cookies up front.

I talked with the woman on my right, who wanted to practice her English. Then the meeting unfolded, and though I couldn't understand much of what was said, I recognized the parts of a traditional meeting. A newcomer gave her talk, and then they passed the basket. I put in a "tooney" which is a Canadian 2-dollar piece, and asked a man for directions back to the bus stop;I knew I'd be turned around when I got out of the church. His explanation was far too complex for me, so I turned to the woman next to me. She motioned me to follow, and she walked with me to my stop. Meanwhile we had a chance to visit, and made a connection. By then the weather had turned colder, but my heart was warmed by the AA exper-ience, one I surely won't forget.

Here's the serenity prayer, in my best French:

O Mon Dieu, donner a moi la serenite d'accepter les choses que je ne peut pas change, Courage a changer les choses que je peut change, et Sagesse conair la difference.

By this time in all probability we have gained some measure of release from our more devastating handicaps. We enjoy moments in which there is something like real peace of mind. To those of us who have hitherto known only excitement, priceless gift. Something new indeed has been added. Where humility had formerly stood for a forced feeding on humble pie, it now begins to mean the σ -- in other words, to all of us -- this newfound peace is - Twelve and Twelve, page 74 nourishing ingredient which can give us serenity. depression, or anxiety


