Learning how to live in the greatest peace, partnership, and brotherhood with all men and women, of whatever description, is a moving and fascinating adventure. -Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p77 This is one of my all-time favorite passages from our literature. What a wonderful ideal to aspire to! Often, in my early sobriety, becoming willing to make amends meant that I made mistakes, eventually making myself uncomfortable (pain is a great motivator). Upon some maturation, though, I can use the "newfound knowledge of myself" and prayer to recognize how others see me, not how I would like to see myself. Here, I become willing to admit that my best intentions might not make everyone as happy as I wanted. I learned that I am to adapt myself to the world; I cannot expect the world to change itself to suit me. Admitting that I've wronged someone even when I think I'm right is a big step for me.

Alcoholics Anonymous will never have a professional class. We have gained some understanding of the ancient words "Freely ye have received, freely give." We have discovered that at the point of professionalism, money and spirituality do not mix. Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelfth-stepper. -Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions p166 On that fateful night when I was twelfth-stepped in treatment, the night-worker who pulled me into the little staff room told me that I couldn't tell anyone what we were doing, as he cold lose his job for talking about A.A. With that statement I knew it was something different from all the lectures I'd endured. It wasn't part of the treatment center's curriculum. It was one drunk, talking to another. That little statement he made might be the thing that caused me to listen, rather than ignoring him like everything else I heard there in treatment. He put himself at risk to help me, rather than talking to me because he was paid to.

Concept 8: "The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities." This concept deals with the ways the General Service Board "discharges its heavy obligations," and its relationship with its two subsidiary corporations: A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. Long experience has proven that the board "must devote itself almost exclusively to the larger questions of policy, finance, group relations and leadership...In these matters, it must act with great care and *skill* to plan, manage and execute." The board, therefore, must not be distracted or burdened with the details or the endless questions which arise daily in the routine operation of the General Service Office for the publishing operations, including the Grapevine. "It must delegate its executive function" to its subsidiary, operating boards. -The Twelve Concepts for World Service Illustrated

MY FIRST INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE.

The road trip of four guys was not going to be just any ordinary excursion of dirty jokes and flatulence, we were going to our first International Convention and we were like four nine-year-olds on our way to a bottle-rocket fight. The walk to the convention center from where parked was somewhat surreal and exited. My friends began to run like they were kids at Disneyland. Inside, it did not seem crowded but I quickly realized that there were more A.A.s in that huge hall than at my most attended area convention event. It reminded me of large airport but with an atmosphere of joy as opposed to impatience. A friendly lady in line started to talk with me right away. This type of genuine interest set the precedent for the rest of the week. I would later refer to the convention as the easiest place on earth to start a conversation.

There were impressive displays set up, including one by GSO Archives and another area called International Hospitality, which my friends allowed me to think had something to do with food. It didn't, but my bro had a seemingly miraculous chance encounter with a member he had met in Germany.

We hit a local meeting that first night that was mostly conventiongoers and the locals were very friendly. It was exciting to see a newcomer who was attending his first meeting ever. The next day I was to help a friend attend his booth where the vendors were set up. Despite the rain, people showed up and I began to grasp the global scope of the convention, not only meeting people from all over the country, but also the entire planet. Something really sunk in for me among these good people who spoke different languages. The desperation of alcoholics, in the face of failure by other means, had extended the hand of A.A. to all continents in only 75 years. Ironically, in the muggy rain, everyone seemed so happy. The convention had not even begun.

That night I was on my way to rejoin friends at a restaurant on the nearby and totally cool Riverwalk. I began to really notice the immense volume of convention-goers. Convention badges were everywhere! Alcoholics had taken over downtown San Antonio! Thank God for that town we were sober. I was caught up in a big crowd crossing the street,

Excerpts from The Grapevine, are printed with permission of the AA Grapevine Inc. under the direction of the ever-present San Antonio police, when an A.A. in the large group crossing opposite of us began to yell and shout in rowdy convention fervor. It started a chain reaction and there were suddenly hundreds of pedestrians gleefully cheering in celebration of our gathering. I felt part of something special and awesome.

That night I checked out the dance with the live band where the band members were admittedly awestruck by the enthusiasm of the sober crowd in the thousands. The jubilation was deafening between songs. I was fascinated by the group of old timers towards the back of the dance floor who were gettin' down and stealing the show amongst the couple of hundred people watching in admiration around them. There was also a few thousand testing the fire code regulations at the first marathon meeting at midnight. The newcomer from the local meeting the night before was up front.

The itinerary included over two hundred meetings. The convention center is built to handle many, large and small, separate events at the same time, but this weekend we had the whole frikkin' place. I later found out that this was the largest convention San Antonio had ever seen. The next day I attended a meeting called "Twelfth-Stepping The Old Fashioned Way" with a panel of old timers. I began to want some grounding, in the midst of all the excitement, to remind me of what A.A. is all about. A story by one of the panel members caused me to more than recall the last cheap apartment I trashed. I was there again with puke on the bed sheets, bottles everywhere and the stench of hopeless despair. I had to take a couple of deep breaths and I thanked God and A.A. that I hadn't been in a spot like that in a while. Millions had avoided misery and death. That was our message. That is what we were celebrating.

There are countless special moments of the convention that I can recall; the total excitement and anticipation of 50,000+ A.A.s before the flag ceremony and first big meeting, the spontaneous meetings randomly popping up here and there, the sharing by a young woman who had gone through the book with new A.A.s in Russia, feeling joined with thousands during my morning meditation, the real effort of one of my fellow travelers to say "Hi!" and talk to as many people as he could, the last old timer standing who sobered up in 1947, and finding out later that people were still wearing their badges and having an impromptu meeting at the Alamo on the Monday after the convention. My friends and I spent the fourth of July with a couple in the fellowship and their two kids: a symbolic exclamation point for our trip. Since my return, my mind sometimes feels like I am still there. The totality of emotions and thoughts is an inexplicable mosaic that will always be a part of me. The simple message I heard over and over is, however, explainable: the energy of love is real. To my Creator and the fellowship that extends worldwide, I am grateful for that message. To my comrades who shared a special moment of their lives with me, I thank you.


