Step 8 Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

Tradition 8 (Short Form) Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

(Long Form) Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we may otherwise have to engage nonalcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. “12th Step” work is never to be paid for.

Concept 8 (Short Form) The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of over-all policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities.

(Long Form) The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities.

fault, the other driver's fault, it's God's fault for putting me in this life, (How about your brother? When he passed away at 64, do you think that he would want to switch lives?). In this life, with humility, you don't get to have all of those negative emotions, the negative behavior traits of pride, ego, being self-centeredness, all of these emotions need to be feed, they need to grow and they are like little snakes that grow and twist into every corner of your heart, soul and mind. Poisonous Vipers that kill all that is good, they need minions, not friends, servants, not helpers, baggage handlers, not companions or friends.

These are just some of the Character Defects that I am finding in myself. I asked the question, how do I walk the narrow path between pride and humility, to balance my life, when to be prideful, when to be humble? The answer is really simple? Walk the path that is best for me, the answer, do I want to be a taker or a giver? Do I want to be fed or to feed others? These are my Choices. Which do you think I should take?

Step 11: It works-- it really does.

Many thanks to the Heights Club, its manager, Sam A. and his assistant, Breda M., for hosting and the Spark of Light group for sponsoring a workshop on Prayer and Meditation and bringing the workshop leader, Tom R., to Albuquerque from his home in Denver, Colorado. The workshop was held at the Heights Club on June 28 from 10am to 3pm. The Heights Club even furnished lunch, asking only a modest donation.

Whether you were a newcomer to AA who was experimenting with prayer and meditation for the first time or an old timer whose spiritual program needed a shot in the arm, we all came away with a new enthusiasm for daily 11th Step work and lots of helpful hints to keep us going and beat back discouragement.

We learned the many reasons why prayer and meditation have been considered an integral part of recovery since AA's beginnings—even more so than meetings! Tom helped us to understand that at its most fundamental level, prayer and meditation will reveal to us what our purpose is and why we exist (and, really, who wants to do without that?). We practiced Tom's simple, but tried and true process for quieting ourselves, listening to God's intention for us that day, writing about it and, if desired, sharing what we received with others.

My husband and I and one of our friends have been doing "90 in 90" with Tom's method since the workshop. While not every day's Step 11 work has been a spiritual "WOW", we all agree that our meditation has frequently yielded amazing thoughts, images, insights and sometimes directives to take certain action which did not originate in our consciousness. Being addictive types, we want more!

Tom was a delightful presenter with his own awesome story. He was able to couple humorous anecdotes with numerous citations to the Big Book or other AA literature to support his points. He conducts his workshops all over the country, driven solely by his conviction that daily conscious contact with God yields benefits which are critical to our life in sobriety, and by his desire to share that with others in recovery. He charged only a nominal registration fee which covers the cost of reproducing his materials.

NEW BUSINESS David working on clarifying to chief probation officer the role of AA in supporting parolees and probation officers in the guise of sponsors. At this point they want full names of sponsors and 10th step worked with parolee and probationers by a quick time frame. These requirements were put forth by the Department of Corrections. How will it get resolved? Communication to be had with them by David and Mike to clarify what the role of AA member/sponsors really are. Mike said he would contact the PO supervisor, as he had 'inside' connections. People in corrections think AA is treatment, they need to be educated on AA. Comment made by intergroup rep. who once attended a workshop where it was stated that persons sent to drug court could be sent to prison if they don't comply with regulations in force, as issued by the Department of Corrections. Ruth G. was CPC chair a few years ago and she spoke with a Metro Court Judge about changing it, and the practice stopped for a time. Carolyn stated that it may just be a cyclical thing, as witnessed in other areas where the government is attempting to regulate intensively. She referenced her experience as a teacher with this sort of thing. "They can't tell us what to do, and we can't tell them what to do", was a statement made. El Centro letter was printed in June PIO and it is available on the website. *Correction was noted in the Pass It On, the editor mistakenly edited urgently needed desk workers announcement in PSI to read only that Central Office is in urgent need of substitute deskworkers; but it should read both regular and substitute deskworkers.
