Step 9 Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.

Tradition 9 (Short Form) Our groups ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve. (Long Form) Each A.A. group needs the least possible organization. Rotating leadership is the best. The small group may elect its secretary, the large group its rotating committee, and the groups of a large metropolitan area their central or intergroup committee, which often employs a full-time secretary. The trustees of the General Service Board are, in effect, our A.A. General Service Committee. They are the custodians of our A.A. Tradition and the receivers of voluntary A.A. contributions by which we maintain our A.A. General Service Office at New York. They are authorized by the groups to handle our over-all public relations and they guarantee the integrity of our principle newspaper, the A.A. Grapevine. All such representatives are to be guided in the spirit of service, for true leaders in A.A. are but trusted and experienced servants of the whole. They derive no real authority from their titles; they do not govern. Universal respect is the key to their usefulness.

Concept 9 (*Short Form*) Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety. Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees. (*Long Form*) Good service leaders, together with sound and appropriate methods of choosing them, are at all levels indispensable for our future functioning and safety. The primary world service leadership once exercised by the founders of A.A. must necessarily be assumed by the Trustees of the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Interview with Probation

Metro Court – Wed. 7/23/2014 I'm David G. and I gratefully serve as the Community Outreachyperson for the Steering Committee of Albuquerque AA Central Office.

I was recently given time (one hour and fifteen minutes) by the Chief Probation Officer of Metro Court to try to explain a little of AAhistory and tradition in regard to legal issues that may arise for folks who have "problems with alcohol". We discussed AA traditions and how they were all achieved through the time-honored trial and error process. I gave the officer, hereafter referred to as J. (anonymity), a copy of the Pass It On from June. There is a beautifully written explanation of why El Centro group has asked to change the description of the meetings to include information that court paper will no longer be signed. J. was also given the GSO pamphlet: "Information on Alcoholics Anonymous" as well as "What Does Albuquerque Inter-group Do for You". J. promised to read the literature and seemed open to the information.

I explained to the best of my ability: 1) what AA does not do and why not. 2) the significance of Anonymity both practically and spiritually. 3) the problem of accepting money in the basket (Tradition Seven) from non-alcoholics. 4) that we want to be inclusive and open to all. Still we must value singleness of purpose. J. asked what we hoped would result from our discussion. I thanked J. for such a good question. I replied that I doubted "court paper" would ever go away. It has been with us for a long time. However I hoped that with education the probation and parole authorities could work with AA to achieve a workable solution for both AA and the rehabilitation of their "clients". I said that the "sponsor" sheet needs to go away right now. In at least one case it has not yet, because I signed one Wed. night. It was, all in all, a very positive exchange of information and a beginning step in the right direction. I will be checking back with the Officer (J.) soon and issue a follow up report on progress on these events.

8-12-2014 - Follow-up Phone Call 09:00

This is a brief synopsis of a phone call from David G. to J. regarding the above interview.

- > Hellos and Etc.
- > Information that this document is being written (on-going) and that I would forward any thing published.
- > Information received that Metro Court judges are currently "in transition". Personnel changes should be complete in September. Policies of Metro Court and Drug Court will probably not be open to change before the process is complete.
- > J. may reach out to Community Outreach for non-AA speaker request for Probation and Parole Staff information and education.
- > Enjoyed the exchange of information and we agreed to stay in touch.
