Intergroup Committee Meeting Minutes

In the absence of Dave C. (CO Chair), Brian H. (CO Secretary) opened the meeting with Serenity Prayer.

Review of the minutes from the August meeting as published in September's *Pass It On*. Brian H. noted that several names (Michael W, Tom C, & Dondo) were inadvertently left off August's attendance roster. Apologies. Minutes accepted.

Treasurer's Report – Steve H – Checking account and prudent reserve in good shape. Income statement: group contributions and sales strong. The month's expenses ran a little high, due to a backlog of newsletter invoices and move-related Qwest expenses. For the month, slightly in the red; for the year, still in the black. Group Contributions really do keep the doors to Central Office open. Thanks for your support.

CO Coordinator - Michael W -Kathy & Michael back up above 100+ desk hours for the month. Total number of regular deskworkers are down slightly. 2 out of 3 desk shifts covered by scheduled deskworkers; the rest by substitutes (mostly regular deskworkers). Still finding space in the new office. Central Office passed gas inspection (whew). New furnace installed and ready to go; roof issues remain unresolved but being assessed. New, fairly large literature order to go out soon. Desktop photocopier will be purchased and installed once space is identified. Old-Timer's Meeting on Saturday (9/9): great time & great stories shared. CO looking into re-contracting Long Distance phone service and replacing

antiquated telephones. Anticipate additional expenses for telephone equipment & service arrangements. Several phone shifts need regular coverage. (Desk worker requirements: minimum 6 months sobriety, membership in a home group, and a training session. Call Central Office for details.)

- EO Sat 3-6 pm shift
- EO Mon 8-10 am opening shift

Alternate CO Coordinator – Kathy H – Still settling in & adjusting to the new space. It's a welcome change working with the new landlord, who is very responsive. Thanks to all who, in their service, support Central Office.

Schedule Editor – Al J. – not present (Kathy H. reporting as Al's proxy). New schedule to be printed by mid-October. Get your changes to Central Office no later than the end of the September. Schedule forms available from Central Office or for download on-line; groups can also phone Central Office and give changes to the desk worker on duty. New schedules are typically published about every 2.5 months.

Activities Coordinator – Melissa C. – Intergroup Speaker Meeting (hosted by District 13) happened Saturday (9/2) – a great job, lots of food & a great speaker. Intergroup Speaker hosted quarterly, usually hosted by the different districts, as a benefit for Central Office.

- 1. Do I ever give the impression that there really *is* an "AA opinion" on Antabuse? Tranquilizers? Doctors? Psychiatrists? Churches? Hospitals? Jails? Alcohol? The federal or state government? Legalizing marijauna? Vitamins? Al-Anon? Alateen?
- 2. Can I honestly share my own personal experience concerning any of those without giving the impression I am stating the "AA opinion"?
- 3. What in AA history gave rise to our Tenth Tradition?
- 4. Have I had a similar experience in my won AA life?
- 5. What would AA be without this Tradition? Where would I be?
- 6. Do I breach this or any of its supporting Traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious, ways?
- 7. How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?

What happened to a common problem and a common solution and tradition one that says I have the right to think, say and believe anything I want Maybe I am a old grouch but I think AA will grow only through unity and split into little fractions. So think carefully before adding any more restrictions please.

The Beauty of Tradition Ten

page 118 The Home Group: The Heartbeat of AA

Sobriety in AA is the first thing in my life that has really worked. I'm grateful to fellow AAs who've shown me how not to drink on a daily basis, and to alcoholics I've never met who established our Steps, Traditions, and Concepts for World Service. When I live these principles to the best of my ability, they keep me sober and in touch with the God of my understanding.

I'm especially grateful for Tradition Ten, where it is suggested that AA groups never get involved in the messy business of debating outside issues. The wonderful "extra" implied by this Tradition is that I, as an individual recovering alcoholic, am free to simply enjoy sobriety in AA, without having to defend my position on *any* outside issue.

You see, I grew up in the sixties. I lived with my parents (one alcoholic, one social drinker) who were closely associated with a small, left-wing private college in the Northeast. It was a school where expressing your

opinions was very important. On campus, where I hung out as a thirteen-year-old, I heard lots of angry rhetoric about Vietnam, civil rights, and a lot else. My parents brought the same kind of political anger home with them, and challenged me to come up with informed positions on the same issues. I was only an eighth grader, but I was expected to engage in adult-style discussions. If I didn't have an opinion on the issue at hand, I was considered a failure or a nonthinker.

Looking back, it was probably great training for a future alcoholic. I got very good at hiding the things I was truly ashamed of (especially the amount I drank), using a smoke screen of vaguely directed political opinion.

As my disease progressed, I was often broke, unemployed, hungover, and in need of a place to stay. Usually my parents would take me in, and for months at a time I'd live at home, trying to get my act together. Deep down inside I knew I was sick and crazy from booze. But at the time, dealing with it was too

frightening. It was easier to engage my parents in a petty debate over some global issue beyond our control than to draw attention to the real reason I was out of work.

Today, I'm sober and grateful for what it was like, what happened, and what it's like now. I'm even grateful to my parents, who put up with me as an active alcoholic while also living with their own illnesses. But I'm especially grateful to the alcoholics who founded this Fellowship and gave us the guidelines by which we run our groups. Tradition Ten frees AAs to concentrate on what we have in common—recovery, unity, service rather than waste time debating outside issues. Angry debate of things over which we have no power can only serve to split us.
