Step 11 Sought to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

Tradition 11(Short Form) Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.

(Long Form) Our relations with the general public should be characterized by personal anonymity. We think A.A. ought to avoid sensational advertising. Our names and pictures as A.A. members ought not be broadcast, filmed, or publicly printed. Our public relations should be guided by the principle of attraction rather than promotion. There is never need to praise ourselves. We feel it better to let our friends recommend us.

Concept 11 (Short Form) The trustees should always have the best possible committees, corporate service directors, executives, staffs, and consultants. Composition, qualifications, induction procedures, and rights and duties will always be matters of serious concern.

(Long Form) On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.

AA GROUP INVENTORY

from GSO

Many groups periodically take a "group inventory," using one meeting for an honest an d fearless discussion of the group's weaknesses-and strengths.

Many groups have written G.S.O. that a group inventory perked up their A.A. activity and made sobriety more exciting and enjoyable-besides getting the message to more and more alcoholics.

The most popular form for taking a group inventory has been the set of questions which the Three Legacies Group, Spokane, Wash., used effectively.

For groups that want to Tenth Step themselves, here is a recent version-suggestions for a program that may bring the group new health and vitality.

- 1. What is the basic purpose of the group?
- 2. What more can the group do to carry the message?
- 3. Considering the number of alcoholics in our community, are we reaching enough people?
- 4. What has the group done lately to bring the A.A. message to the attention of physicians, judges, members of the clergy, and others who can be helpful in reaching those who need A.A.?
- 5. Is the group attracting only a certain kind of alcoholic, or are we getting a good cross section of our community?
- 6. Do new members stick with us, or does turnover seem excessive?
- 7. How effective is our sponsorship? How can it be improved?
- 8. Has everything practical been done to provide an attractive meeting place?
- 9. Has enough effort been made to explain to all members the need and value of kitchen and housekeeping work and other services to the group?
- 10. Is adequate opportunity given to all members to speak and participate in other group activities?
- 11. Are group officers picked with care and consideration on the basis that officership is a great responsibility and opportunity for Twelfth Step work?
- 12. Does the group carry its fair share of the job of helping intergroup? The Grapevine? G.S.O.? Groups in institutions?
- 13. Do we give all members their fair chance of keeping informed about the whole of A.A.Recovery, Unity, and Service?

"If a mere code of morals or a better philosophy of life were sufficient to overcome alcoholism, many of us would have recovered long ago. But we found that such codes and philosophies did not save us, no matter how much we tried. We could wish to be moral, we could wish to be philosophically comforted, in fact, we could will these things with all our might, but the needed power wasn't there. Minutes The printed Pass it on was not available. A motion was approved to table review of the September minutes until the November Intergroup meeting.

Treasurer's Report Sales for the month of September were up. We are still down for the year in sales. Cost of sales was up due to a large book order that came in. The expenses were in line with previous months. We had a net loss of \$1,727.15 for September. Year to date, we are down \$5,776.97. We have not touched the prudent reserve this year, by managing inventory and expenses. But, the checking account is getting low so we may need to tap into the prudent reserve. We hope that group contributions and sales will increase. In the past, we had a CPA who was a member of the fellowship who helped out by checking on things at the end of the year. This individual is older now, and is no longer able to do this. If any of the groups have a CPA who would be willing to volunteer some time to look at things at the end of the year, or semi-annually or quarterly that would be a good thing for central office. Please announce this at your groups. Total Revenues: \$7,028.00 Cost of Sales: \$3,174.22 Gross Income: \$3,853.78 Total Expenses: \$5,580.93 Net Income: (\$1,727.15)

Central Office Coordinator Thanks to Aaron for doing a good job with the treasury. The last two months, between the Grape Vine and World Services, we've spent over \$5,000 in literature. Amount of sales are down, and that does make a difference when we operate on such a thin margin. We are kind of short-handed on desk coverage at the moment. We are down to 44 regular workers, which is kind of low; we like to have around 50 or above. Substitute workers are down as well, but the phones are being answered. The groups are doing a good job covering the night phone. During the week, the night phone gets turned over at 10 PM and taken back at 8 AM. On Saturday, the night phone is turned over at 9 PM and taken back at 9 AM Sunday morning. On Sunday, the night phone is turned over at 9 PM and taken back at 8 AM Monday morning. I brought the quarterly group contribution list for Intergroup this month. Central Office was able to donate \$82.10 in literature last month. We give literature to people taking meetings into treatment facilities, correctional facilities and corrections committees for districts to pass along to groups. This is part of our mission and I am happy we are able to do that.

Pass It On Editor Between software problems and difficulties printing, the printed PIO is not here today but will be available at Central Office on Monday. The PIO is available online now. Birthday submissions are steady, but I would like to see that grow. Requirements for birthday submissions: first name, last initial and sobriety date. Due to policy, we do not publish a sobriety birthday before the sobriety date. Article submissions are still at zero. Please submit articles of 300-500 words on personal sobriety topics. I am checking with the DCM's, and considering printing some kind of district report section in the PIO.

Media Librarian The media library is at Central Office and currently has 243 CDs of people telling their stories. They can be rented for a \$2 deposit, which is refunded when the CD is returned. 18 new CDs have just been donated.

Web Guardian There is a link to the media library available on the website. I post the fliers that I receive from groups on the website events page.

Schedule Editor We have about 25 changes to the current schedule so far. We will probably have another printing sometime in December.
