Basic safety considerations are things that all of us should keep in mind and do our utmost to uphold; AA is a safe-haven for many of us and it needs to remain so.

There are times when I take exception to what I hear in some of If we find some speakers, or what they say objectionable, then we do not have to go to that particular meeting. If we are that concerned, we can bring the matter before the Group Conscience, or we can simply vote with our feet! We have a lot of AA meetings; we can find an alternative meeting if we really want to. Or, perhaps this is little more than another use for our

When an Amend Doesn't

I've been through this many different times when my wife misplaces her phone and the search goes something like this. "Honey, I can't find my phone."

"Where did you leave it?"

"I don't know. It's not where I usually put it"

So, we search the house, her purse, the cars, and then its: "I'll call your phone, and we can find it by its ring." I've done this drill many time and sure enough somewhere in its hiding place, we find it. This time, after much dialing, and listening, we cannot hear the phone and therefore, we cannot find the phone. Looking and dialing, dialing and listening, hoping to hear that tiny tune that says "Here I am." but to no avail is there a giveaway tone.

This is where the decisions are made about whether or not we need to have the service turned off and get a new phone, or wait until next day and try again, backtracking our steps and see if someone might have found it.

Now, after making up our minds on the next step, my phone rings and things get interesting. It's my step-son, "I just got a call from (Name withheld); tell mom that she has her phone. "What? Why didn't she just answer the phone when I was calling it?" I gave my phone to my wife, and she listened to her son's story on how someone found her phone, called daughter, and made an exchange. My wife then used one of our friend's phone to call her, because she wouldn't answer it if my name was on the caller ID, and set off to get her phone. When we married, her youngest daughter and me were at ends with each other from the very start. That edgy relationship got more and more ragged as the years went on. It seemed that there wasn't anything that I could do or say that brought us any closer. As long as I performed to her advantage, I could get along with her, but any criticism, or suggesting of a different way of doing something, I was tolerated. I stood by, watching and drinking and more drinking, as she went from bad situations to worse situations, being there when called, and bailing her out relax. more times than I could count. I lived in a bottle, and she lived in my wallet. Not a bad relationship for a drunk. When my disease took over my life and I could not contain it, and my wife left me, she went to live with her daughter, things got really edgy then.

I was about 30 days sober when I tried to make an amends to the step children. daughter, even listened, I was informed that

this time "I would pay a price for my actions." At that time, all I was interested in was making an amends, cleaning up my side of the street. To hell with what they did with it. I just wanted to be free of this emotional hangover. (I didn't even know what that was at this time of my sobriety.) I told my sponsor what I did, and he wasn't too happy with me. He told me I wasn't ready to do that, I wasn't ready for their reaction, and I shouldn't have done it. What did I care, I was sober, somewhere between 30 and 60 days, I knew what I had to do, and I did it anyway. I finished my 12 steps with him, and due to circumstances, we went our own way. I soon realized that this first time through the 12 steps wasn't my best effort, and I found another sponsor and went through them again in a very different style. One that lead me get to know him and myself while working the steps. When we came to step 9, he had already known about my first attempt, and made suggestions on how to try again. I told him they wouldn't even see to me, let alone talk to me. He told me it was time to send them a letter, an amends letter, and let it go from there.

I did what I was told to do, and sent the letters. The daughter never responded and I was still in the same situation as before. After I got the phone call telling me who had the phone, and she wouldn't even text me back, I felt the old resentments building up. I needed to find a meeting, and I did. After the meeting, I pulled a friend over and asked him to give me a couple of minutes. After telling him about my resentments, he put it into a different place.

He told me "She's been hurt and she doesn't want to be hurt again, so she shuts you out, for fear of being hurt again." Bam, that old 2X4 learning. Here I was thinking it's all about me, how it's what I have to do and have done, my whole world was wrapped up in my people pleasing lifestyle. It wasn't me, it is her, and I can totally understand what is going through her thoughts. My resentments unwound, I could take a breath, and relax

Because of AA, the 12 Steps, and sponsors and friends with more years than me, more insight and wisdom. I can breathe easier, worry less about "things I cannot change, and the wisdom to know the difference.

Also, they are now transporting a member to meetings and planning to take a regular meeting into a Physical Rehab. (Not sure where)
- Website Coordinator: Leanna gave her report. She urged us to explore the website, and to encourage our group members to use it. She said there's lot to read on the resource page, old archives and so on. Re: flyers, the simpler, the better. Get the facts to her and she will get them right up on the events page. The Support page shows how you can donate to A.A.
- Central Office serves a large area 5 districts in the Albuquerque area and basically the whole state. Most used pages are the meeting schedules, price lists for literature, and meeting changes info.
- Intergroup Liaison: Johnny goes to lots of meetings, introduces the work of Central Office, talks about faithful 5's and 10'ers.

- New Business Debra requested that the group consider sending her to Kansas City for the annual Intergroup Seminar, Nov. 3 6, cost \$810. She will gain ideas on how to attract new people to the work of C.O., and other ideas. A motion was made, and seconded to send her. 
