Terminal Uniqueness

(from the grapevine) August 1983

THE FRESH perspective of new members always cheers me, so I was listening closely as one of them talked at our Wednesday night gathering. I identified with him when he began talking about his problem of "terminal uniqueness." So that's it. It is a disease and has a name. After all these years of suffering, what a relief!

Actually, by the time that newcomer enlightened me by identifying the problem, I was already using the AA program to begin to cope with it. Still, a name has helped me to make a few steps toward identifying the symptoms and to develop some tentative ideas about arresting it.

The basic symptom of terminal uniqueness a compulsive desire to achieve superlatives: to be the best this, the worst that, the most here, the least there. My specialty was being the most right. Just about any issue would do--the world economy, child rearing, brands of beer, anything as long as I got across the point that my view on the matter was the correct one. A corollary of this is not accepting advice. If I'm unique and right, then anyone who is giving me advice must be wrong. (Since coming into is AA, I've figured that if I had a dollar for every piece of good advice I've ignored in my lifetime, I'd be rich. And if I'd actually followed the advice, I'd probably be a serene millionaire. But that's getting ahead of the story.)

Terminal uniqueness is also progressive. In my late teens and early twenties, all

I needed to do to bring out my uniqueness was to focus on something I did a little bit better than most other people--probably not such a bad activity for a young man trying to muster up enough courage to go out and face the world. Soon, however, I had to start discounting what other people did well. Other people's strengths had to be in some way irrelevant or unimportant. It was my actions that counted.

Once the uniqueness syndrome was combined with my alcoholism, I had to change the ground rules again. With heavy drinking, it became harder to find things that I was good at, so I had to be the most something else: most radical, most nonconforming, most bullheaded. (I referred to that last item as "most mentally disciplined.")

Victims of terminal uniqueness, like alcoholics, are the last to know when they are entering advanced stages. Skillful rationalization must be used to parry the telltale signs. People who didn't invite me to their parties were too frivolous for my type; friends who didn't have time to visit when they were in town were too straight for my life-style; contractors who suddenly realized they no longer needed my services were too sloppy for my exacting standards.

But can uniqueness really be terminal? Probably only when combined with alcoholism. With nonalcoholics, it simply seems to be carried into bitter old age. But for me, after years of rationalizations

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Corrections Corner

The Comienzos program is an educational and therapeutic program serving men who are incarcerated at the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Detention Center. It teaches the skills and cultivates the awareness that is needed to live in freedom.

Comienzos offers classes in:

- Learning and Practice in Nonviolent Communication, as developed by Dr. Marshall Rosenberg;
- Meditative practices, including seated meditation, T'ai Chi Chih, and yoga;
- 12 Step Recovery

I conduct the 12-Step Discovery program. Some of the men are addicts, some alcoholics, some cross-addicted. But as addicts/ alcoholics we share the same condition, we just express the addiction with different substances. We use both Narcotics Anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous materials in our sessions.

We face some unique challenges in our 12-Step Discovery sessions. Some of the men spend many weeks in the program. Others spend only a short time due to release or transfer. Much of our time is spent in the first three steps and introducing newcomers to the program of recovery from addiction.

Relapse prevention is another important component of our work. Many of the men coming out have few resources and limited support. And are in immediate need of a sponsor. But they do have meetings, their Higher Power, and the support of the brothers and sisters in recovery.

The Comienzos program has plans to expand its offerings and is always looking for volunteers and other assistance. And other opportunities for addiction outreach (i.e., volunteer speaker) are available at the Metropolitan Detention Center.

As an alcoholic and addict myself, the 12-Step Discovery Program is an integral component of my recovery. The men I work with are a blessing to me.

Corrections Corner cont.

"Hello Albuquerque AA, I wanted to write just a little bit about my past two years serving a commitment to bring meetings into the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Detention Center. At first I was a bit intimidated - I had not been to jail before, and did not know if I had anything to offer these women. Then, the grace of God stepped in: I went to my first meeting and it was just like any other AA meeting! There was no difference between the women in jail and myself, save for the fact that, thanks to a program for living and the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, I was allowed to leave the jail when the meeting was over that night. There were nights when I went, tired and unwilling, and during the meeting heard exactly what I needed to hear to re-inspire me for another day of sobriety. I have cried in gratitude on my way home - not for the blessing of being allowed to leave, which was a blessing indeed, but for the grace and hope of these women who, though incarcerated, were becoming free from the bondage of self. For the better, this service commitment changed my sobriety and it changed me.

As my commitment comes to a close this month, I invite you to contact Brian V. (District 11 and Area Alternate Corrections) to get involved (or re-involved) in corrections service work and pass it on to some people who really need the hope of AA. Here is Brian's information:

that enabled me to be the most this or that, it was only a small step to becoming the only human being whose liver wasn't affected by alcohol or the one alcoholic who could drink just three beers a day.

It was after one of those short-lived "three beers a day" periods that I tried AA for the first time. Years of training enabled me to go to my first meeting and come away with my uniqueness intact. I was the non-smoker who didn't need group meetings; but most important, I could easily do without those meetings because of my unique intelligence. After all, if I would be glad to engage in a conversation (or argument) about the fundamental paradox of man's existential condition. Who needs to sit around and listen to people who think problems are solved by putting the plug in the jug and living one day at a time?

It worked, too. For eleven months, I didn't go to another meeting and didn't have a drop to drink. Then, my unique intelligence worked out this brilliant scheme: I could start drinking again; but this time, I would drink only three beers a day. (You will notice that I haven't discussed my unique memory.)

My last "three beers a day" stage lasted for a few weeks. In the one and a half years of drinking that followed, the glamour of establishing and maintaining uniqueness began to fade. Why was the greatest landscaper in the business going months at a time without work? How come such a congenial guy was spending so many hours alone in taverns that smelled like naphthalene and stale urine? For years, I could bound out of bed and get several hours of work done while the rest of the household slept. So why was I lying in bed with a body that seemed to be filled with lead shot and a head that must have been harboring cannons?

By the time I hit AA again, I wasn't as interested in being unique as I was in finding out about those bright-eyed, cheerful people who talked about putting the plug in the jug and living one day at a time.

Listening to those people, I came to see that I wasn't even a unique drunk. I drank more than some and less than others; a few were crazier and many more were saner than I; my bottom was neither the lowest nor the highest. After I became comfortable about being just another drunk in the accepting atmosphere of AA, I came to see that out in the workaday world, I am just another guy; and that this is not only okay, it is beautiful. A great burden was lifted when I became one of the fellowship of human beings.

As in several other things that have happened to me in AA, there is a paradox involved in this story. I now know with every fiber of my being that I *am* a unique individual. Except for a vague knowledge that I developed this awareness after getting into the program, I have no idea where it came from. (Well, there are rumors about a higher power.) The understanding of my individuality provides solace for me these days, but it is not the foundation for my growth.

For growth, I must look for those things I have in common with other people. Common faults give direction to change, and common strengths allow me to find out who I am.

I have learned this in AA, and for this I am grateful. I am also grateful that one newcomer gave my false search for individuality a little class by providing it with a name.


